Both in Ely and Dublin, the choir offered a local benefit concert. In 2018 the choir sang at Great Saint Mary's Church in Cambridge. This year the concert was in support of repairs to the school associated with the parish church of Monkstown, a delightful town on the seaside just south of Dublin.
